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OUR VIRTUAL OPEN EVENING

t the end of August, Cornwall was designated an 'Enhanced Response Area' to help tackle the rise in Covid cases, so we decided to hold our annual Open Evening as a virtual event.

STUDENT VOICE SURVEY

his term, students completed a large-scale student voice survey. The purpose of this survey was to obtain student views so that we as a school can work together to make improvements. The survey explored students' experiences and outlook on school life as well as summarising any concerns they have. Students were allocated time to complete their submission during tutor time with their tutors so that they had support if they had any concerns about the survey.

The responses have been shared with students and include the following:

- 94% of students said that they always feel safe walking in the corridors
- 93% of students said that they always feel safe around the school grounds at breaks
- 91% of students say that they always experience kindness in classrooms
- Over 90% of students enjoy being at The Roseland Academy every day!

The results also showcased some areas where students have witnessed unkind behaviour and also highlighted areas of the school where students do not feel as safe in as others.

Our newly elected Student Leadership Team act as representatives for each tutor group by facilitating conversations and sharing ideas about how we can make improvements following feedback from the survey.


