A WELCOME MESSAGE...

Spring has certainly seen The Roseland Academy coming to life with the resumption of many routines and extra-curricular events that have had to lie dormant over the past year. In particular, it has been great to invite parents back into school again for our Family Learning events, most recently with a focus on Year 11 study skills and revision techniques to help students enhance their chances of success in the upcoming assessments. This is a joint effort of support from school and home as our students prepare for the final push before the first exam season in two years. As part of our dedicated Careers and Apprenticeships weeks in March, we welcomed a wide variety of local professionals and entrepreneurs into school to talk to students as part of a series of events and workshops. These presentations allowed our students to hear first-hand the routes into an array of careers and training opportunities and feedback has shown the students found the weeks extremely useful in deciding next steps beyond school.



Our students have made the most of Sports fixtures with some fantastic achievements, in particular from the Girls' Football team who won the School Games Winter Final. Our students were exemplary on the English Department's recent trip to the Hall for Cornwall to see 'Wuthering Heights'. With much more planned for the summer term, it has been great to see students making the most of opportunities we have all missed so much.

This term, we have further developed our Behaviour Curriculum in school which is underpinned by our Trust's values of Kindness, Ambition and Responsibility for all. We have had a real focus on the core Roseland Routines that allow for high quality, uninterrupted learning to take place in all lessons. Students have responded extremely positively, with one Year 9 student telling a member of staff that "standards are so high now around the school". This term we have opened our school to a number of visitors from other institutions across Cornwall who have been impressed by the students conduct in lessons and social areas.

As part of our Trust-wide mission to provide outstanding education for all, exceptional teaching and learning in the classroom underpins everything we do. We have continued to develop and refine our practice to make the most of every minute of lesson time. This term we have been developing some exciting techniques to promote extended writing skills across all departments and these will be rolled out over the next term. Fluent reading is a core skill and ongoing practice continues to be a high priority across all year groups. Further developments to our reading age testing and intervention programmes are planned for after Easter and into the next academic year.

Now that, hopefully, the worst of the pandemic is behind us, The Roseland Academy is having a real push to maximise student attendance in school. Every day really does count and research from the Department for Education reveals that only 17 school days missed a year can equal a drop of a whole grade in achievement. We would like to work with parents and carers to prevent as much missed education as possible. If you have any concerns about your child's attendance, please contact their tutor at the earliest opportunity so we can work together to ensure attendance levels do not fall. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

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TRIAL EXAM WEEK

This term saw the return of many things that we have not been able to do since 2020 due to Covid restrictions. One of the returning events is our Trial Exam week.

Trial Exams took place from Monday 10 January until Thursday 20 January. They mimic what the actual GCSE Exam season will be like when Year 11 students sit exams in the Summer Term.

Trial Exam week is so important as it gives students the experience of undertaking tests in exam conditions, in their exam seats with the required equipment and working in silence for the allocated exam time. This has proven beneficial as students are aware of what to expect which helps to calm nerves as they already know where they will be sitting, what they require and what the procedures are, such as where to put their bags, where to line up and the timescales in which to complete their exams. This exercise is also imperative in identifying any knowledge gaps which can be targeted in revision, giving students a heads up as to what level they are working at and areas to focus on in each of their subjects.

Year 11 students were presented with their results from their Trial Exams in a similar way to how they will collect their results in August. Their results were sealed in an envelope and presented to them. Students were given the opportunity to open their results and discuss them with their peers and teachers in the Hall. Results were also emailed home to parents/carers to see too.





FAMILY LEARNING

Another exciting event to return this term was our Family Learning Sessions. Our first evening since 2019 was one of the most important: Year 11 Preparation for Exams. Year 11 students and their families were invited to attend The Roseland Academy to discuss revision techniques for a variety of subjects for the exam season. Subjects were organised into carousels, families attended the core subjects, which every Year 11 student will sit an exam in, then they were given a choice of options subjects to meet with to discuss different revision techniques and what to expect to cover in the run up to the exam season. Family Learning Events are vital in ensuring school and family collaboration so that students revise in similar ways in both settings to maximise effectiveness in their revision techniques. It also gives parents/carers an opportunity to discuss expectations with teaching staff about how long should students be revising, as well as what is being covered in lessons.

THE ROSELAND TRUST COLLABORATION

On Tuesday 4 January, Towan Class from Tregony Community Primary School visited The Roseland Community Farm to launch their new topic 'Amazing Animals.'

Towan Class got to learn about the animals at The Roseland Community Farm and undertake animal handling sessions with the bearded dragons, leopard geckos, chickens and rabbits.

On Monday 14 March, Little Carne Nursery who are based at Tregony Community Primary School also visited The Roseland Community Farm. The students loved meeting the animals at the farm, in particular the goats, Demelza and Elizabeth. The nursery pupils enjoyed their visit so much, they have arranged for it to be a fortnightly event, so we now see them every other Monday! This is a brilliant collaboration to get students used to attending The Roseland as part of Multi Academy Trust events and also to keep up to date with how the animals are doing.

In late January, Mr Harris, Teaching Team Leader for Humanities and Miss McWilliams, Teacher of Humanities, visited Gerrans School's Key Stage Two class. Miss McWilliams delivered a lesson about Ancient Egyptians, studying and understanding the history of them through photographs and artefacts. Mr Harris delivered a Geography lesson and was impressed with the students' interesting questions. Transition events like this are fantastic in preparing younger students in the catchment area for when they move up to secondary school as they will recognise familiar faces.

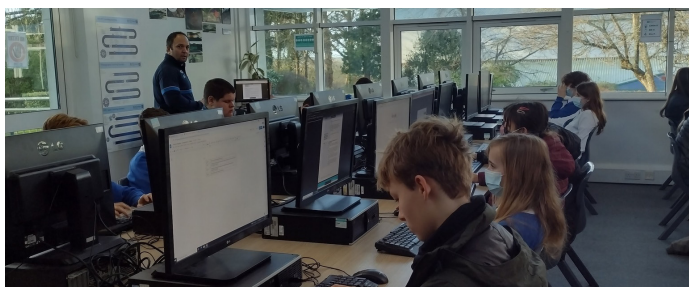
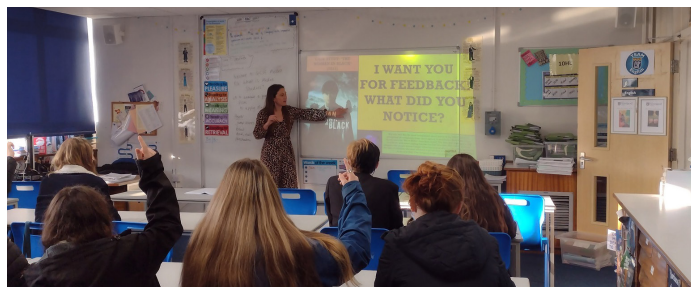


YEAR 9 OPTIONS DAY

On Friday 4 February, Year 9 students had a day off their usual timetable to undertake in our first Options Day. The aim of an Options Day is to give the students taster sessions on different options subjects, to make them aware of what work is involved, how the exams are marked, what topics are covered and what a general lesson entails. Different options featured included media, engineering, ICT, sport and business – many subjects that students will have not tried previously. For sport and engineering, instead of practical examples as students will already be aware of what that involves students were given a taster of what written work is expected in the course.

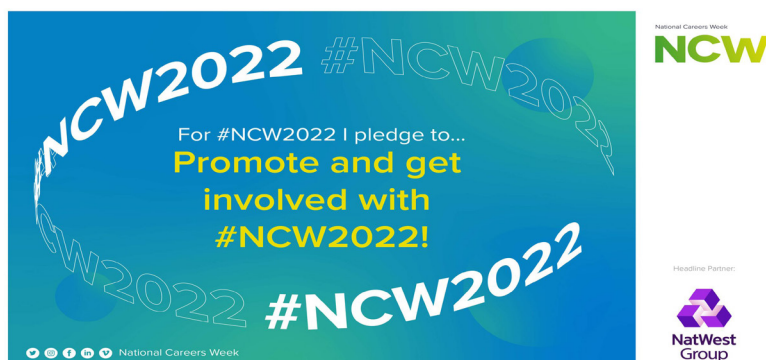
CAREERS

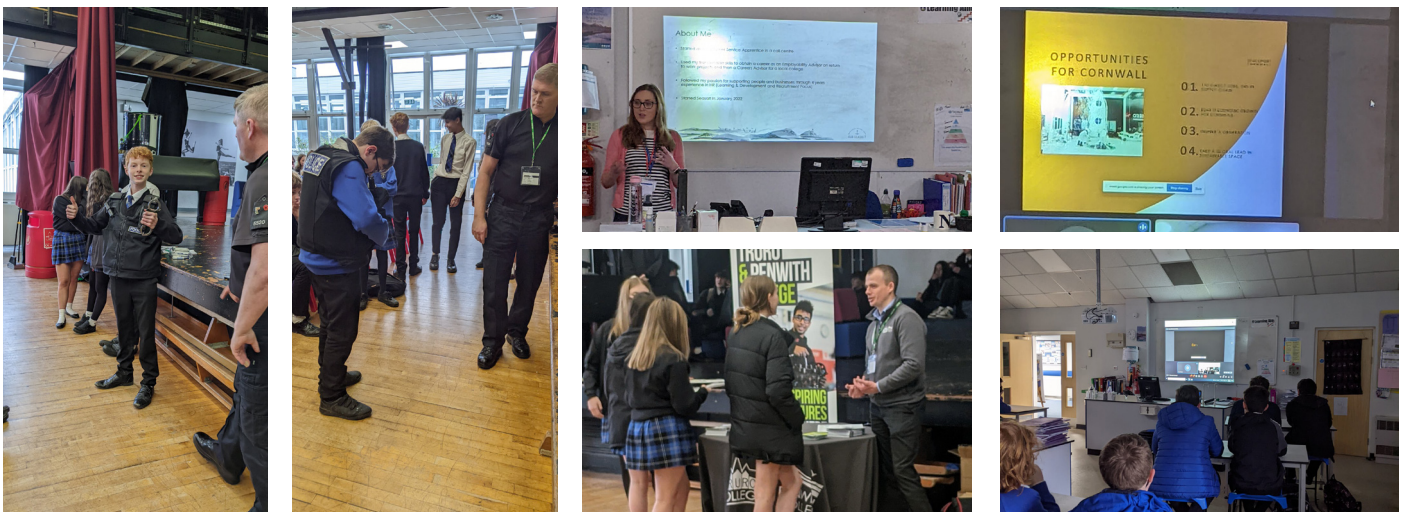

NATIONAL CAREERS WEEK

National Careers Week takes place throughout the week of 7 March. The aim of this week is to promote the importance of good careers education in schools and colleges and to ensure students are aware of as many options as possible so they leave school confident in their next steps. For this week, we were fortunate to have a variety of speakers from different professions who took the time to visit us in school to share information about their careers. Students were given the option to sign up to any session that they wished to attend.

We had representatives from Devon & Cornwall Police, Spaceport Cornwall, Kovia Environmental Consultancy, Seasalt Clothing, Tourism Truro, Cultivate Cornwall and Cornwall Marine. We also had an online session with Ms CeCe Sammy-Lightfoot, a Vocal Coach and TV presenter, who joined a group of students on Tuesday 8 March and spoke about International Women's Day, what it means to her, how to develop confidence and women who inspire her. We were also joined virtually by Ms Fiona McGuire who specialises in Careers in Film.

It was an incredibly busy week however all students got fantastic opportunities to network and gain an insight in different professions. Students also took part in tutor time quizzes and activities in lessons with a focus on careers.



WORLD BOOK DAY

Thursday 5 March saw The Roseland Academy celebrating World Book Day for the first time in school since 2020. World Book Day is all about celebrating reading for pleasure. The theme for this year was 'You Are A Reader'.

This annual event is loved by both staff and students as it gives the opportunity for Team Roseland to dress up as their favourite storybook characters, share our favourite books with each other and giving the reasons why we love them so much. Staff had the chance to read extracts from their favourite books to students and discuss the impact reading has had on them. Throughout the day, the school bell was organised to ring randomly. This was to notify staff and students that it was time to DEAR – Drop Everything And Read!

It was great to see everyone dressed up. We had many different characters, such as Little Red Riding Hood, Alice in Wonderland, Gangster Granny, Wally from Where's Wally, Lyra from the Golden Compass and many more roaming the corridors of The Roseland Academy... including Headteacher, Mr Clarke as the BFG!

For World Book Day, we usually raise money towards charities such as Book Aid International, however this year due to current events we decided to fundraise for the Disasters Emergency Committee Ukraine Crisis. We were appreciative that parents/ carers and students supported this decision and we raised an outstanding £1074.52 to donate.

Another new club that we introduced this term is Breakfast Club. We have set up a station outside of the BASE and we hand out toast or breakfast snacks to any student who wants it.

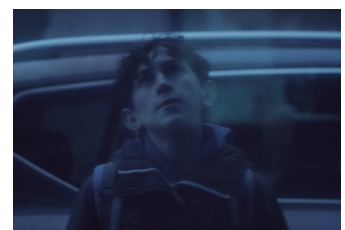
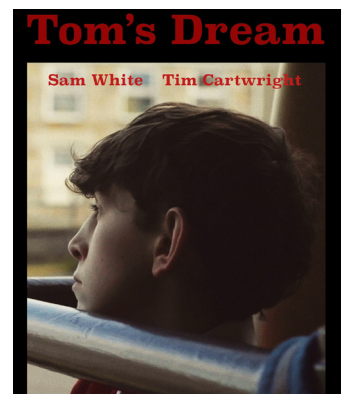
TOM'S DREAM

The concert took place at Falmouth's Princess Pavilion and secondary school students attended from across the county. The wide ranging programme cleverly traced the development of music from the Baroque period to the present day and was performed by some fantastic professional musicians from the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, as well as other special guests.

COMPOSER VISIT

Composer Mr Ian Stephens is a successful musician and composer based in Liverpool. His work has been performed by the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, Hallé Orchestra, Royal Northern Sinfonia, has been broadcast on BBC Radio 3 and 4, and his children's ballet 'Pinocchio' is currently touring with the Northern Ballet.

He also guided Year 9 students through a 'democratic composition' exercise, working collaboratively to create an original piece of music from scratch.

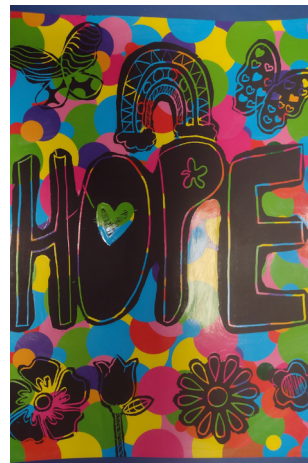

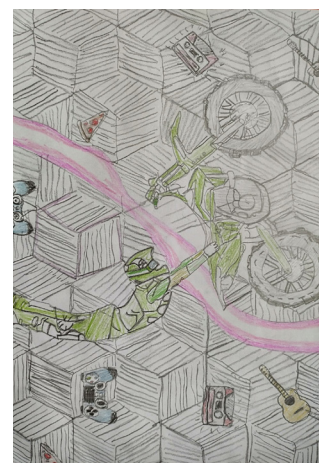

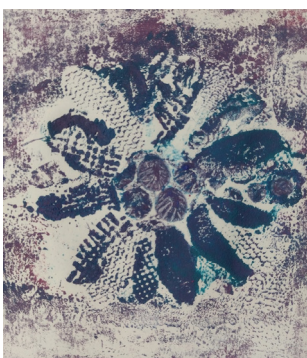


FLORA AND FAUNA WORK

Year 8 students have been busy in their Art lessons looking at the theme 'flora and fauna'. Students started this work by looking at drawings of plants, flowers and seed pods.

They researched the artist William Morris who utilised the natural forms of plants in his designs but never copied them literally. Morris believed that patterns should have "beauty, imagination and order," using these principles across all his work.

The Year 8 students then worked on creating their own designs based on flora and fauna. They experimented with different print-making processes so they could make an informed choice of what they would rather produce as their design. They made their print based as either a collagraph or a lino print.
